CAPA JUDGING COURSE

Are you interested in learning more about photography, or how to evaluate photographic images, or maybe you wish to start on the journey to become a national judge. Attending a course on judging is a way many photographers improve their skills, even if becoming a judge is not a goal.



CAPA is pleased to provide our comprehensive and renowned course that teaches how to view and understand an image, comment on the strengths and opportunities, and how judges score images in a club and CAPA competition. This full-day course will make you a better photographer and includes a copy of the CAPA Judges Manual. This course is mandatory as the first step in CAPA's judges' certification process. It is required for current judges who are near to or past their 5th year anniversary since last taking the course.

- Identify the strengths and weaknesses in a photograph
- See the message the photographer intends
- Spot the criteria that make a photograph great
- Understand the techniques used to create the image
- Set aside your own personal bias when evaluating



HELPFUL TIPS

SHOOT RAW

If at all possible always shoot in RAW. Many phones can now shoot in the RAW format. If you are a Lightroom user, try downloading the Lightroom phone app and using the camera through the app.

A RAW file is an unprocessed (in most cases) version of the image file which doesn't sacrifice image data for file size. RAW files have a number of downsides, including the size of the file and the fact you have to edit them. However, the upside is that you have a lot more control over the final look of the image when it comes to editing.

HOLIDAY LIGHTS

Try to be set up for dusk. Some ambient light might help your image by adding a little detail to the surroundings.

If you are shooting in an urban area they can be a little more forgiving as there is always some ambient light.

Set your exposure for 2 or 3 stops underexposed.

PHOTOGRAPHING IN SNOW

Remember that light is an important element, try to shoot in the golden or blue hour rather than the midday sun.

The camera wants to capture everything to grey, you need to over-expose. For snow photography, a good rule of thumb is to increase the exposure by "+1", also known as one stop.

CHECK YOUR HISTOGRAM

Checking your camera's histogram can help you with exposure.

To get the most detail in your images, its best to try to "expose for the whites". This means to try to make the whites as bright as you can without overexposing or 'clipping the whites'. You can reduce the exposure in post-processing to get the exposure you envision.

CAPTURING BIRDS IN FLIGHT

You'll need a fast shutter speed and good sunlight. (Use Shutter Priority or Manual mode. Camera set to Auto ISO). Birds against the sky usually come out underexposed, so to combat this, dial up your exposure compensation to perhaps +2/3 as a starting point. Set your focus mode to 'AI Servo' ('AF-C' 'continuous' for some brands) so the camera is always updating/tracking the focus on the bird.

If you wish to practice capturing birds in flight, try going to the lake where there are gulls. Start with a slightly shorter focal length and build up to a longer lens. This is a great way to practice for when you have the opportunity to shoot something more spectacular.

EXPECT TO SHOOT A LOT OF RUBBISH

This is the advice from the legendary Martin Parr: "The basic theory is the more rubbish you take, the better the chances of a good photo emerging, so keep on taking the rubbish."






